Welcome to our second quarterly update for 2024 and our last report before we cease operating on 30 June 2024.

Thank you for your support of Te Waka over the years. We are proud of what we have achieved for the region during our tenure, and we are grateful for the messages of support received in the last few weeks.

We have wrapped up our work with a very busy quarter of activity focused on key industries and our four strategic pillars: insights and intelligence, industry growth, regional advocacy, and collaboration and partnerships.

In May, we released the results of the latest Waikato Business Sentiment Survey. Despite challenging economic conditions, the survey revealed that Waikato businesspeople are maintaining a pragmatic level of optimism. These results highlight the diversity and resilience of the Waikato business community.

Advocating for the region remained a core focus. We submitted responses to the Long Term Plan consultation processes for Thames-Coromandel District, Matamata-Piako District, Hamilton City, and Waikato Regional Council, and on the Ōtorohanga District Council's Draft Economic Wellbeing Strategy.

We believe strongly in the importance of council consultation processes. It is a key means to ensure community voices are heard and that people have an opportunity to have input on decisions that shape future economic development and prosperity in the region.

Another focus for Te Waka has been to support the growth of the Waikato's technology sector. A highlight was our role as the regional coordinator for Techweek24. We were pleased to promote and support the delivery of three major events in the region, providing a platform for tech innovators, entrepreneurs and enthusiasts to network and share ideas. The vibrant tech ecosystem is crucial for driving innovation and economic growth in Waikato, leveraging the region's skilled workforce, digital infrastructure, and supportive business environment.

Renewable energy is another sector with significant growth potential for our region and New Zealand as a whole. In April, we attended the opening of Hiringa Energy's Green Hydrogen Refuelling Network, the first commercial network of its kind in Australasia. Heavy freight is a significant contributor to our region's emissions profile and economy, with over a quarter of New Zealand's freight moving to and through the region. Green hydrogen initiatives will play an important role in fostering sustainable growth in a key Waikato industry and supporting our region's transition towards a clean energy-based economy.

Waikato's geographic location at the nexus between New Zealand's two major ports positions it as a vital hub for trade and logistics. The advantage of Waikato's location not only means enhanced supply chain efficiency, but it also attracts businesses looking to capitalise on the region's connectivity and accessibility. It also supports the growth of key industries such as agriculture, manufacturing, and technology, providing opportunities for economic expansion and job creation.

The Waikato is one of the fastest growing regions in the country. As we look to the future, we see immense potential in leveraging the region's unique assets and strategic advantages to foster sustainable growth.

Thank you again for your continued support of our mahi and mission. We all remain passionate advocates for a cohesive regional approach to economic development and we look forward to supporting the continued prosperity of this incredible region, which we are all proud to call home.

# **Insights & Intelligence**

#### **Waikato Business Sentiment Survey**

In May Te Waka released the results of the latest Waikato Business Sentiment Survey. The results showed that Waikato businesspeople are maintaining a level of pragmatic optimism, despite tough economic conditions and the prospect of a continued recession.

Despite a slight decline in overall sentiment, businesses remain optimistic with 43% expressing confidence in their own performance and 48% anticipating an upturn in the regional economy over the next 12 months.



The full survey results are available on <u>Waikato.com</u>, along with District-level and industry-specific insights, including confidence levels, the major barriers to growth, and regional infrastructure priorities. #### **Regional Economic Data and Insights**

The team has continued to update the economic data and insights shared on Waikato.com, including updates to our Regional Economic Dashboard to add Housing Affordability data for the Waikato region.

We also shared regional and district analysis of the first set of Census 2023 data published by Statistics NZ, looking at overall <u>population growth rates</u>, the region's changing <u>ethnicity profile</u>, and the <u>age profile</u> of the region. The Census results confirm the strong growth profile of the Waikato, reflecting our relatively young population and the attractiveness of our region for employment and lifestyle opportunities.

#### Techweek24

As the regional coordinator for Techweek24, Te Waka was pleased to promote and support delivery of three key events in the region:

- <u>Waikato Māori Digitech Networking</u>: Organised by local industry leader Lee Timutimu and hosted at
  the Te Wānanga o Aotearoa Glenview campus, the event was a valuable opportunity for the Māori
  tech community and supporters to kōrero, connect, and learn about the Takiaho movement and the
  mahi being led by Lee and Nikora Ngaropo to map the Waikato Digitech ecosystem. Te Waka was
  pleased to sponsor this event alongside Te Wānanga o Aotearoa.
- <u>Engineering in Action Day</u>: The Waikato Engineering Careers Association (WECA) and Winter partnered to deliver the 2024 Engineering in Action Day which enabled ~100 senior secondary school students to visit local engineering businesses. The 12 businesses that participated provided tours of their workplaces, showing young people various engineering roles in action.



• <u>Tech Waikato</u>: Te Waka hosted the panel session of industry experts at LIC's 10<sup>th</sup> iteration of the popular Tech Waikato event. The 120+ attendees participated in an un-conference to start the event, followed by the interactive panel discussion moderated by Te Waka's Rosie Spragg, and a thought-provoking keynote from Gallagher's Lisbeth Jacobs.







#### Developing apprenticeship models

During the quarter we continued to support the Waikato Tertiary Tech Alliance, hosted by the Ministry of Education, in the development of an apprenticeship model for the local technology sector. We have been supporting the design of the 'navigation' support framework and helping to prepare stakeholder surveys to capture detailed feedback on the design.

#### Tech Step Te Kuiti

We were pleased to hand over lead coordination for the Te Kuiti TechStep event to Waitomo District Council. This event, scheduled for 7 August, will explore the possibilities of entering a career in technology by showcasing education pathways, earn as you learn programmes and businesses who offer entry-level opportunities available in the technology industry.



#### Renewable Energy

#### Green Hydrogen Refuelling Network Launch



In April Te Waka had the pleasure of attending the grand opening of Hiringa Energy's Green Hydrogen Refuelling Network, the first commercial network of its kind in Australasia. The event took place at the Wiri, Auckland refuelling station, a cornerstone of a strategic network that spans Hamilton, Tauranga, and Palmerston North, serving hydrogen trucks across the upper North Island.

Reflecting on our visit to the Waitomo Group Te Rapa site during its construction last year, it's fantastic to celebrate this important milestone in our journey towards decarbonising the freight industry. Speakers at the opening event highlighted the importance of partnership in delivering the network, and the opportunity for New Zealand to realise significant environmental and productivity gains as the green fuel industry scales.



#### **Electricity Authority Consultation**

We lodged a <u>submission</u> on the Electricity Authority's (EA) consultation on the Future Operation of New Zealand's Power System. In our submission we called for the EA to undertake scenario planning for higher demand scenarios, highlighted our concerns about inadequate coordination of network planning and investment across the NZ power system, and reiterated our concerns about the lack of a national energy strategy. Our submission was developed in collaboration with key stakeholders, including iwi representatives.

#### **Agriculture & Food**

#### **Fieldays**



Te Waka was pleased to attend the 2024 Fieldays®, including celebrating the Waikato-based finalists for the Fieldays® Innovation Awards.

We congratulate our local winner of the Young Innovator Award, St Peter's School for Mark-It, a drench gun attachment that marks the side of a sheep's mouth to help farmers easily keep track of which animals have been treated. The judges commended Mark-It for its simplicity and practical approach.

#### Aquaculture

As a member of the Waikato Regional Aquaculture Group, Te Waka was pleased to formally endorse and promote the Regional Aquaculture Strategy, including providing commentary for an NBR article on the strategy. We also provided feedback on the Draft Action Plan which identifies priority actions for delivery in the coming months.



#### **Promoting International Education**



Enabled through funding provided by Education New Zealand, Te Waka was pleased to host the Waikato-leg of an inter-regional tour for international education agents, in partnership with Auckland Unlimited and Education Tauranga.

Te Waka partnered with Wintec, the University of Waikato, Vision College, and local secondary schools to host four international agents representing Thailand, Vietnam, and Latin America.

During their visit, the agents toured several tertiary campuses, participated in a networking lunch with local international directors, and were taken to visit key sites in and around Hamilton. They also experienced the hospitality and vibrancy of our region, dining in our world-class local restaurants.

International education plays a crucial role in the growth of the Waikato economy and the vibrancy of the community. Prior to disruptions caused by the pandemic, it was estimated that international education contributed \$280 million annually to the Waikato economy, supported over 3,000 jobs, and attracted students from over 80 nations.



## **Regional Advocacy**

#### International Delegation: Suva City Council Visit



Alongside the Waikato Pacific Business Network, Te Waka hosted representatives from the Suva City Council on their visit to the Waikato region with PacificTA to exchange expertise and knowledge with councils in the Pacific Islands.

We provided a regional economic briefing, highlighting our region's growth priorities and approach to economic development in partnership with the Waikato region's various councils.

#### International Delegation: British High Commissioner Visit

We had the privilege of supporting a visit to the region from the British High Commissioner to New Zealand, Iona Thomas OBE. Her visit included a tour of the Waitomo Caves, a place of reflection, meditation and renewal, connecting Mana Whenua to their identity, land and ancestors.

Continuing to strengthen ties between Waikato and the UK holds significant potential to bolster trade and investment, deepening our relationship and fostering economic prosperity. We are thankful for the support from Te Nehenehenui, Waitomo Mayor James Robertson and the Waitomo Caves team for a memorable experience.



#### **Submissions: Council Long Term Plans**

In support of the Long Term Planning (LTP) processes across the region, Te Waka made formal submissions on the Long Term Plan consultation processes for Thames-Coromandel District, Matamata-Piako District, Hamilton City, and Waikato Regional Council, including a presentation at the hearings for the Waikato Regional Council LTP.

#### Submission: Ōtorohanga District Council Draft Economic Wellbeing Strategy

Te Waka submitted on the Ōtorohanga District Council's Draft Economic Wellbeing Strategy, commenting on the strong alignment between the draft strategy and the region's agreed economic priorities. Te Waka provided specific feedback on the economic wellbeing challenges and actions identified in the draft strategy, drawing on district-levels insights from the Waikato Business Sentiment Survey.

## **Collaborations & Partnerships**

#### Waikato Pacific Business Network

Te Waka was pleased to support the Waikato Pacific Business Network's networking event in June. CEO Fiona Carrick was a panellist at the event, speaking about how we can enhance productivity for businesses in our region.

The panellists discussed the need for a holistic approach, combining strategic investment, data-driven decision-making, skills development, innovation, infrastructure development, and collaboration, to form the foundations for sustained productivity, economic growth and competitiveness in the region.



#### **Waikato Economic Development Forum**

Te Waka chaired its final Waikato Economic Development Forum, hosted by South Waikato District Council in May. The forum brought together economic development practitioners from across the region, providing opportunities for knowledge sharing, collaboration and collective problem-solving.
